

Tsavo Trust has been formally endorsed by KWS as a key stakeholder / partner in the TWNP




Black rhino population trends in Tsavo



- Estimated 20,000 rhinos in 1940
- 98% decline between 1960 - 1989 bringing them close to the brink of extinction – 20 individuals
- Approx. 215 today


- Kenya Black Rhino Action **Plan** sets out the long-term goal of:
 - \succ A net annual growth of at least 5%
 - \succ Vision of 2,000 individuals in the wild by 2037
 - Current population 1,000



• Tsavo's IPZ represents the most viable wilderness area to recover large numbers of **free ranging** black rhino • It also provides space for excess rhino from other fenced sanctuaries • Kenya remains the stronghold for Eastern black rhino subspecies (80%) making this population globally important

TSAVO WEST NATIONAL PARK INTENSIVE PROTECTED ZONE - TSAVO CONSERVATION AREA - KENYA



Tsavo Conservation Area, southern Kenya, 42,000km²

- Tsavo West National Park 7,900km² (Kenya Govt. owned)
- Intensive Protection
 Zone (3,000km²)

TSAVO HOLDS A KEY 1 BLACK RHINO POPULATION Kenya's black rhinos have increased threefold in the last 40 years.

- In Tsavo:
- NGULIA SANCTUARY 1985 with 9 founding rhinos

INTENSIVE PROTECTION ZONE - 2008 with 18 founding rhinos

Ngulia sanctuary has now exceeded carrying capacity and has too MANY rhinos.



A RARITY IN TODAY'S WORLD **Opportunity to significantly grow black rhino numbers** Tsavo West National Park has the potential to hold over <u>800</u> black

rhinos, 14% of the world's population.

Looking forward, this project aims to upgrade the IPZ to become rhino ready. The budget over the next 10 years is US\$20m with a significant amount needed in the first two years. Funding options for the Suzuki Rhino Club: 1. Provision of water to the TWNP IPZ base - drilling of a solar powered borehole

2. Phase 2 IPZ base upgrade to include armory, office block, ranger accommodation block

3. Construction of 8 holding pens for rhinos – in preparation for moving rhinos out of the overstocked NRS into the IPZ



1. Water Supply to the TWNP IPZ Security Base

Currently the IPZ base relies on water being

trucked in from far using a water bowser,

incurring significant costs and logistical issues.

SOLUTION – drilling of a solar powered borehole

- Reduction in costs transportation
- Reduced dependency on external water sources
- Reliable water supply for staff, wildlife and conservation activities boost morale
- Environmental sustainability reduced carbon footprint

Total Budget: US\$50,000

\$20,000 for borehole drilling\$20,000 for solar system and pump\$10,000 for installation of water tank

- Total Budget: US\$100,000

2. Phase 2 IPZ Base Upgrade -**Construction of an armory, office**

Currently inadequate facilities hindering daily operations, communications and response

Phase 1 upgrade in 2023 including 2 ranger accommodation blocks, central mess and kitchen

Enhanced rhino security – improved response rate, weapon and equipment storage etc.

Enhanced operational efficiency – centralized

administration hub and improved staff morale

Enhanced communications – reliable and efficient

coordination and improved crisis management

3. Construction of rhino holding pens and transportation crates – in preparation for moving rhinos out of the TWNP NRS and into the free ranging IPZ **Currently there are no holding pens or rhino crates in the Tsavo rhino area** and are unprepared for incoming translocations of rhinos. Tsavo Trust, in partnership with KWS, plans to:

> 8 secure rhino holding pens to be located at the TWNP IPZ base > Construct 4 sturdy and safe rhino crates to facilitate the safe

transport of rhinos within TWNP and from other sanctuaries.

Enhanced rhino welfare and improved safety to facilitate a smooth relocation process. Total Budget: US\$80,000

Holding pens: US\$60,000 **Transportation crates: US\$20,000**
